Our Communion hymns speak of resurrection because we connect our eating and our drinking, spiritually, to the life to come.

What are other terms we use for Communion? Eucharist, from the Greek for "thanksgiving." "A foretaste of the feast to come." "The Lord's Supper." It may seem insignificant sometimes, or upon first glance, but we gather around the Table for meaningful connection and to enact a deep part of our theology.

The new life we seek (even to live in this life) points to a time when all are welcomed, all receive, all have a place of belonging, and we live that out on Sunday mornings when we share in Holy Communion. We long for that Easter day when all are One.

So as we gather as the faithful, as we proclaim Christ crucified and risen, we also share in a meal where no one is turned away, and where all have a place – that is what we believe, and we are called to *live into* even now, not at some future time. Because we have been received and welcomed by Christ, we are sent into the world to be that welcome and compassion of Christ in the world.

We begin the month of March, this year, with the Transfiguration mountaintop story. A couple of days later, we have ash on our foreheads as a reminder of our mortality. In it all, we are reminded that we are the Body of Christ in the world, seeking justice, peace, and unity. May we journey in Lent towards that new day, and live that new day each day.




Every year on Transfiguration of Our Lord Sunday, we hide the *alleluias*. It's a physical reminder to all—not just our children!—that we refrain from speaking it in our worship space through the rich and contemplative season of Lent.



Many of us "give things up" this season in our non-church lives, like sweets, alcohol, or cussing. But collectively as Christians, we give up saying *alleluia*. It's like we're casting our alleluias into a six-week time capsule that we will open on Easter Sunday in celebration of The Resurrection. But until then, and throughout the season of Lent, we must reflect on *why* we refrain from this form of praise. And, perhaps, we take something else on in its place.

OSCAR ROMERO

(commemorated on March 24)



In a packed country church, Romero encountered the silent endurance of peasants who were facing rising terror. Their eyes asked the question only he could answer: Will you stand with us as Rutilio did? Romero's "yes" was in deeds. The peasants had asked for a good shepherd, and that night they received one.

Archbishop Romero's greatest helplessness was that he could not stop the violence. All he had to offer the people were weekly homilies broadcast throughout the country, his voice assuring them, not that atrocities would cease, but that the church of the poor, themselves, would live on. He stated, "If some day they

take away the radio station from us...if they don't let us speak, if they kill all the priests and the bishop too, and you are left a people without priests, each one of you must become God's microphone, each one of you must become a prophet."

Oscar Romero was assassinated on March 24, 1980 while presiding at the Eucharist. The day before, he openly challenged an army of peasants, whose high command feared and hated his reputation. His voice rose to breaking, "Brothers, you are from the same people; you kill your fellow peasant...No soldier is obliged to obey and order that is contrary to the will of God..." There was thunderous applause; he was inviting the army to mutiny. Then his voice burst, "In the name of God the, in the make of this suffering people, I ask you, I beg you, I command you in the name of God: stop the repression.

advancement, and to support and elevate their implementation. Significant barriers to gender equality remain (the World Economic Forum suggests it will take until at least the year 2158), yet with the right action and support, positive progress can be made for women everywhere.

Focusing on the need to Accelerate Action emphasizes the importance of taking swift and decisive steps to achieve gender equality. It calls for increased momentum and urgency in addressing the systemic barriers and biases that women face, both in personal and professional spheres.

The goal is simple: a gender equal world. A world free of bias, stereotypes, and discrimination. A world that's diverse, equitable, and inclusive. A world where difference is valued and celebrated.
